VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR NCC MOBILE PANTRIES AT IPC

Neighborhood Christian Centers will be offering two June Mobile Pantry events in the Independent Presbyterian Church west parking lot (IPC also hosted an April Mobile Pantry), and they have requested our help distributing food to families in need on those days. On Fridays, June 12 and June 26, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m., 10 to 15 IPC members will help load car trunks with packages of food as drivers pull through the line. THE IPC SESSION HAS VOTED TO RETURN TO IN-PERSON WORSHIP NEXT SUNDAY, MAY 31, FOR BOTH 8:30 AND 11:00 WORSHIP SERVICES

For each worship service, we will be able to:

- Seat approximately 250 worshippers on the floor area of our Sanctuary every other pew;
- Accommodate 150 worshippers in the Fellowship Hall;
- Seat up to 50 worshippers ages 65+ in the Chapel; and
- Seat up to 50 worshippers in the Balcony who are who are immune-compromised or who have other health concerns.

We will also Livestream both worship services through our YouTube channel.

As we seek to love and care for each other, please remember the following:

- Practice social distancing (6-8 feet apart);
- Wearing a mask is **strongly recommended**;
- For those seated in the Balcony, masks are **required**;
- Make use of the hand sanitizer stations located throughout the building, as well as hand washing and hand sanitizer receptacles located in the restrooms;
- Tithes and offerings may be placed in the designated boxes in the Lobby and Narthex or given online; and
- For the present time, we will not have Sunday School or nursery services.
